- Youth reproductive health and sexuality  
(clinic, HIV/AIDS, teenage prostitution, sports ...)
- Community media & ICT (computer training, cyber café, Ghetto 99.9 FM ...)

# The aims of the library

- Create a conducive environment for learning
- Equal access to textbooks (primary/secondary)
- Academic material for students
- Infotainment rather than entertainment
- Leisure books
- An alternative meeting place

The library serves:

A community of some 80,000 inhabitants  
(population density of about 43,000 per square kilometre, 65% under 30), 5 secondary schools, 14 primary schools, students in colleges, technical institutions and universities

# Cooperation

- E-mail to IFLA asking for partners of cooperation (2004)
- Cooperation based on the following principles:
  - Equal access to information
  - Modern ICT solutions
- Stressed the need for basic library training

# Library automated system

Open source software:

- Low costs (in principle free)
- No vendor lock-in
- Our choice: Koha
  - Internet based
  - Easy to download records (Z39.50)
- SIDAREC OPAC

- Home page for organisation and library
- Strategic plan
- Acquisition plan
- Cataloguing completed
- Secured funding

# What remains?

- Responsibility of running Koha to be transferred from Norway to Kenya
- Collection development:
  - Purchase local material
  - Internet resources to supplement traditional collection (newspapers, journals, OA)
- Outreach activities/Promotion of reading and literacy (Already offers: puppetry, theatre, video shows, youth/elder forum for intergenerational learning and story telling)
