


The Library's mission is to provide comprehensive resources and services in support of the research, teaching, and learning needs of the University community.

1. Understand the research, teaching, and learning needs of its users







2. Build collections and create tools to support research, teaching, and learning






3. Provide access to and promote the discovery and use of local and external information resources

# Reconceptualizing the Mission





"High individual users of electronic re




- Mass digitization promotes discovery of collections.










## The Library as Place


- The physical library inspiring spaces where people interact with resources and with each other

# The Mansueto Library: Considerations

- Digitization
  - making print collections obsolete?
- Service
  - delayed vs. realtime collection access?
- Impact on existing library buildings ...and Cost?





# The Mansueto Library: Serving the University

- Library as Intellectual Discriminator
  - Usage Statistics
    - 20% of items in Reg circulated at least once in the past eight years (3.4M charges)
    - 431,395 "only once" charges: cutting-edge research Avoid 150 interlibrary loans a day
  - Digitization
- Recruitment and Retention of top Humanities and Social Sciences Faculty
- Future Flexibility in existing Library buildings

# The Mansueto Library: Design

#### On-campus location

 stand-alone building connected to Regenstein Library via bridge

#### Below ground storage facility

- 3.5m volume capacity in high-density automated shelving (total campus capacity: 10+ million volumes)
- minimize impact on campus green space



# Above-ground elliptical glass dome

- Reading Room and Circulation service center: real-time access to collections
- Preservation: Conservation and Digitization Laboratories






